My brethren in Christ, Peace and grace of the Lord.



I enjoin all of us to keep our departed brethren in prayers specially this month. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed through the mercy of God rest in peace.



GOSPELINSPIRATION

I BELIEVE IN THE COMMUNION OF SAINTS

A devoted Christian mother after returning from the morning Mass celebrating the Solemnity of All Saints turned to her eight year old boy and asked, "would you like to be a saint?" He promptly responded saying, "I don't intend to be a priest!" Such is one of the many conceptions about sainthood in the Christian world.

Sainthood is not an exclusive of a few. Every November 1st the Church celebrates the Solemnity of All the Saints, known and unknown, especially the canonized, that is those whose sanctity of life is approved and put forward for emulation and intercession by the Church. The feast of All Saints, among other things, is a reminder of our common vocation to holiness: "Be holy for I the Lord your God I am holy".1 It is also an apt reminder of our common destiny to be with God at the end of it all in the beatific vision. As Pope Francis puts it, the Saints are those who never lost focus of their vocation.2 Their faith powered their hope towards its object, love who is God. To the saints, the love of the Lord is better than life.3

The saints are those who did battle with the world and with themselves and are victorious. They are victors. The Book of Revelation says of them, "who are these people, dressed in white robes, and where have they come from?... These are the people who have been through the great trial; they have washed their robes white again in the blood of the Lamb. That is why they are standing in front of God's throne and serving him day and night in his sanctuary."4

The saints wear the crown of victory now because they had lived out the beatitudes - feeding the hungry, giving water to the thirsty, clothing the naked, sheltering the homeless poor, visiting the sick and prisoners. It is not so much of the big feats they achieved but the much love they put in the little they were able to do in the lord's name. Faithfulness in the little things of life earned them the crown of life, for "a little thing is a little thing but faithfulness in little things is a great thing"5

St. Augustine, commenting on the prayer Our Father, reminds us of our relationship to the saints when we say "your kingdom come". In those words we are expressing our desire to be caught up in the destiny of the saints. "This it is that thou dost long for; this desire in thy prayer, that thou mayest so live, that you mayest have a part in the kingdom of God, which is to be given to all saints" 6

We share a common destiny with the saints for where we are they once were, and where they are we ought to be and are invited to be. To reach their present abode, the "Blessed Rules" of the beatitudes must be followed with utmost love.7 To enjoy the blessedness of the saints we must not look to the big shots but pay attention to the seemingly inconsequential ordinary things and events with pure love of God.

The Saints, our heroes and heroines of faith were not necessarily people with no history of sin, but people who had the right attitude to sin. They fall rarely but rise promptly. And they did their little, ordinary parts in extraordinary ways. St. Theresa of the Little Flowers for instance remains one of the most astounding saints who teach us the value of the "little" as the key to sainthood. Blessed Theresa of Calcutta teaches us the same lesson with her charism with the poorest of the poor in India. Associating in love with the little brings exaltation. The little, gradual steps of the saints have taken them eventually to the mountain of God, in eternal happiness. Those little, gradual steps are expected of us if we are to join them in the kingdom of eternal joy which lasts forever.



STORY OF A SAINT

Saint Margaret of Scotland (c.1045-November 16th 1093)

Patron Saint of those who suffer the death of a child, large families, learning, queens, Scotland, widows

Margaret was born in a time of political upheaval. Her father, Edward d'Outremer, heir to the English throne, was exiled to Hungary where Margaret grew up. When she was twelve, her family was allowed to return to England, but then they were forced to flee again. Margaret's family was given refuge by King Malcolm III of Scotland. The king fell in love with the beautiful young Margaret, and the two were married at the royal castle in 1070.

By her good example and power of persuasion , Queen Margaret convinced the king that prayer and spiritual life were important. Margaret also promoted a return to the practice of religion and education among her subjects. She also initiated synods of the bishops , which she participated in , to deal with abuse and scandals in the Church . Margaret was a devoted mother to her six sons and two daughters. She instructed them in the Catholic faith. Her son David went on to become king of Scotland and is also a canonized saint.

"How do you tune your band?" asks Saint Peter.



- 2. Contribute via online banking by emailing your name, address, parish name and municipality (e.g. Durham and Scarborough) to campaign@archtoronto.org, in response to which the Archdiocese of Toronto will email you account information which you can use to set up the Archdiocese as a payee for the purposes of online banking. Your one-time or recurring gift will then be forwarded to our parish.

INDULGENCES TOWARDS ALL SOULS DAY CELEBRATION (NOV 2)

A plenary ("full") indulgence, which is applicable only to the souls in Purgatory is granted to the Christian faithful who devoutly visit a church or an oratory on (November 2nd,) All Souls Day.

Requirements for Obtaining a Plenary Indulgence on All Souls Day (2 Nov)

- Visit a church and pray for souls in Purgatory
- Say one "Our Father" and the "Apostles Creed" in the visit to the church
- Say one "Our Father" and one "Hail Mary" for the Holy Father's intentions (that is, the intentions designated by the Holy Father each month)
- Worthily receive Holy Communion (ideally on the same day if you can get to Mass)
- Make a sacramental confession within 20 days of All Souls Day
- For a plenary indulgence be free from all attachment to sin, even venial sin (otherwise, the indulgence is partial, not plenary, "full").

You can acquire one plenary indulgence a day.

A partial indulgence can be obtained by visiting a cemetery and praying for the departed. You can gain a plenary indulgence visiting a cemetery each day between 1 November and 8 November. These indulgences are applicable only to the Souls in Purgatory. A plenary indulgence, applicable only the Souls in Purgatory, is also granted when you visit a church or a public oratory on 2 November. While visiting the church or oratory say one Our Father and the Apostles Creed.

A partial indulgence, applicable only to the Souls in Purgatory, can be obtained when saying the "Eternal rest grant unto them o Lord, and let your perpetual light shine upon them. May their souls rest in peace" prayer.

As a parish, we shall plan to make a communal visit to the Catholic cemetery on November 2nd and pray for our loved ones immediately after the 9am Mass.
